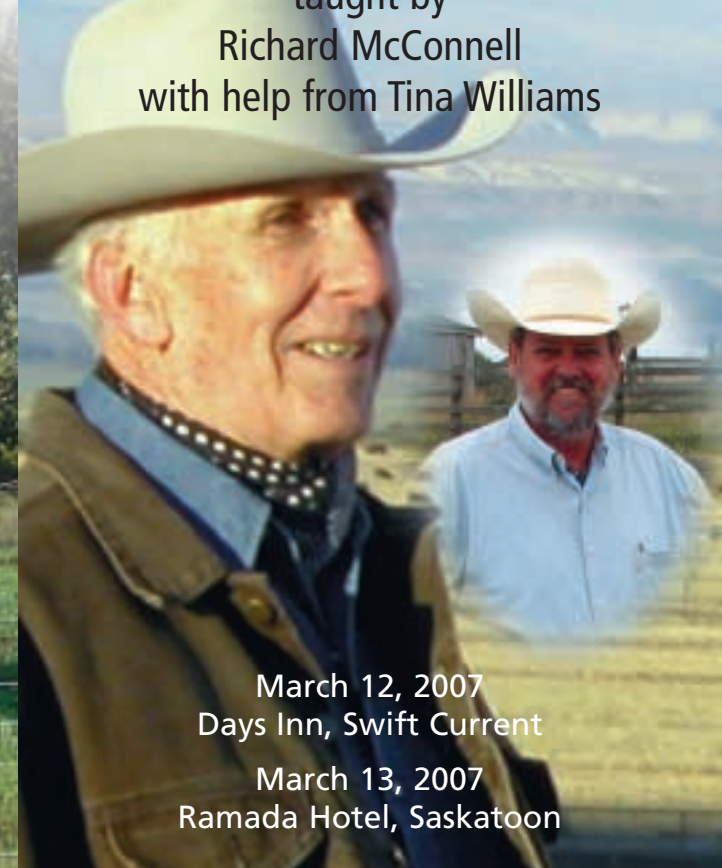

About the Presenter

Richard grew up on a dairy farm near Republic, Missouri. In 1980 he graduated from the University of Missouri-Columbia with his BS in Agriculture Education. He received his Masters in Ag Ed in 1983 and taught Vocational Agriculture for 13 years in Odessa, Missouri.

In 1993, Richard purchased a farm in Polk County, Missouri, where he now runs a small cow-calf and stocker operation. He has fine tuned his management intensive grazing system of 14-16 paddocks with fescue, switchgrass, eastern gama grass, red river crabgrass and legend lespedeza. Wanting to reduce input costs, he is near achieving his goal of year round grazing without feeding hay. Using stockmanship he is able to manage his herd to utilize forages ready for harvest, train newly received stocker calves, weigh animals with ease, and sustain herd health.

In 1997, Richard started working for the Polk County Soil and Water Conservation District as a Watershed Project Manager. Today he manages two Special Area Land Treatment projects. He works with landowners to promote sustainable agriculture, conservation practices and a healthier environment using rotational grazing, stockmanship, soil productivity, and resources management.

Realizing the need for better handling of livestock, Richard has been working closely with Bud with the intent to share with others the benefit of low stress handling techniques.
